Lane discipline is strictly enforced in Dubai. Tailgating, sudden lane changes, or aggressive driving are serious offenses and can lead to heavy fines or license suspension. Always use indicators and keep a safe distance from the car in front.

Know the Parking Rules

Dubai has both paid and free parking areas. Be sure to pay for parking in paid zones using RTA's SMS or app system. Illegal parking can lead to your rental car being towed or fined.

Accidents Must Be Reported

If you're involved in a minor accident:

- 1. Move your car to the side of the road, if safe.
- 2. Call Dubai Police (999) to report the incident.
- 3. Wait for the green (go) or red (at fault) slip, which is required for insurance claims and car repairs.
